

Physical Education and Sport Premium 2022-23



The Government provides additional funding each year to improve the provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport - is allocated directly to primary school Headteachers. The funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on the provision of PE and sport in schools.

Oakworth Primary School received £19,540 for the academic year 2022-23.

Purpose of funding

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they have the freedom to choose how they do this.
